


Details of Architecture


DESIGNERS


Great details interact with the big structures





The architect and industrial designer Thomas Sandell collaborates closely with Habo Selection. He has, for example, designed the TS series, which features door handles for indoor and outdoor use, handles, hooks and knobs.

THOMAS SANDELL



Thomas Sandell's portfolio includes renowned designs such as the famous Gåshaga Brygga at Lidingö, the interior of the Stockholm Stock Exchange and IKEA's famous chair Vågö, for which he was awarded the Red Dot design award in 2001.

 Great details should barely be noticeable until you get really close. Then you should be amazed and feel: Wow, this is a nice handle, or whatever you're reflecting on. Says Thomas Sandell, one of Sweden's most distinguished architects and industrial designers.

Now he is ready to launch his and Habo Selection's new TS series, which consists of door handles for indoor and outdoor use, handles, hooks and knobs. Door handles should be nice to hold and great to look at, he says. - We touch and are touched by these many times every day when we open and close doors.

The new products are available in several different materials, including brass and matt chrome.

- For Habo Selection we use genuine materials that convey quality and weight, says Thomas.

 Yellow metals are modern and popular, but we also use timeless materials such as matt chrome, which is always a commercially viable metal.

Five years of product development

Thomas and his colleagues at sandellsandberg are currently drawing 9,000 homes and the starting point for TS is that the collection should work both for new apartments and older houses.

- The goal has been to create a long-term design that lasts over time since the handles and knobs will be used for many years, he says.


 The collection therefore has a low-key expression, you almost shouldn't think of it as design. Succeeding with this requires a sense of proportion, a feeling that usually takes many years for a designer to develop. According to Thomas, industrial design itself is a time-consuming activity. For example, the TS collection has taken almost five years to develop. – Great industrial design takes time. There are several parameters to sync, such as shape, material selection and the intended environments of the products. For interior design, the challenge lies in finding a design that does not scream but still adds something to the whole, something that subordinates itself to and interacts with the other architecture, he says. – With TS, we have created a great collection with a quiet design that we will use in several of our housing projects.

House numbers – when typography meets architecture





For most homeowners, it's commonplace to spend time and energy on choosing outdoor furniture, house color, wallpaper in the bedroom and fabric for the sofa. But what about house numbers? Our exclusive collection of house numbers and letters has been developed in collaboration with font agency Letters from Sweden and design agency Grand Public. The collection consists of two tailor-made typefaces that meet various styles of house and architecture.

– Why have a white plastic sign with Helvetica numbers on your house when you can choose something that harmonizes with the architecture? It feels like more and more people understands the value of design, and selecting your house number with care is a natural step to take when you build your dream home, he says.

Göran says that he grew up in the Stockholm suburb of Östberga, where some of the first Swedish graffiti paintings were found.

– I remember drawing several paintings on paper, and then proceeded to draw different fashion brands' logos. In high school, I studied graphic design and got to draw classic antique fonts and learn more about typography, graphic design and printing technology. I think I was already sold back then, but it was not until 20 years later that I really took this interest seriously and started my business.

Typography is the basis for graphic design

According to Göran, typography is the basis for all graphic design and plays a major role in the public space. – Should you be forced to take away everything but the most important thing in a graphical composition, only typography would be left, he says.

 Typography is used wherever and whenever something should be communicated, and to design new fonts that can communicate and at the same time create some kind of aesthetics or identity is fascinating.

He finds inspiration for new typefaces through the collaboration with interesting people, but also in older typography books and exciting expressions in various areas. – Most of all, however, I'm probably inspired by the process itself, I really love my job, says Göran.

 Creating a new font is like a trip where anything can happen, and the challenge of getting all the characters in a typeface to work together and look natural is very inspiring.

Room for improved interplay between typography and architecture

Regarding the fusion of typography and architecture, Göran believes that there is great

potential for improvement. – Now, I don't know the process for choosing typefaces to house numbers on new buildings, but sometimes it seems as if a sign manufacturer has been contacted in the last minute. A manufacturer who then selects a standard font from their catalog, he says.

 There is a great opportunity for deeper collaboration between architects and typeface designers. I mean, all typeface designers would consider it a dream project to draw letters and numbers to entrance doors, elevator signs and information boards for newly built or restored buildings.

The biggest difference between designing a typeface for print versus house number, according to Göran, is that a house number is a physical, three-dimensional product. – For house numbers, one must consider how the numbers will look in a certain size with a certain depth when drawing them. The depth also affects the shape, as you don't always look at the house numbers standing right in front them as you do with printed typography. In addition, house numbers don't really need a strong relationship with other

characters in the same way as in a complete typeface family, so you may think more freely. Although Göran believes that the interplay and collaboration between architecture and typography can be improved, he thinks that there is lots of house number design that is good. Especially on houses and buildings where creativity as well as clarity in terms of architecture and typography have taken center stage.

- Some modernism houses at Gärdet in Stockholm are amazing, and the entrance gate to Hornsgatan ó2, for example, have very nice house numbers, he says. - But if I should choose a favorite, I would like to choose something close to where I live, the Barnmorskan area in Enskededalen. I respond to the houses in that area every time I ride my bicycle. It's an area with 22 townhouses built 2008 to 2010. Here they have truly focused on designing nice house numbers. Black, big numbers, probably 1.5 meters high, against a white wall. The numbers have an industrial expression and appear to be custom-made just for these houses. On the other side of the road you will find classic villas, providing a nice contrast.


Timeless details in a playful mood

When design accessories manage to be both beautiful and versatile they add something interesting to the room, both in terms of aesthetics and functionality.

The knobs and hooks in the series MF by Monica Förster manage to do just that. With a sleek and sophisticated look they add class and style, while at the same time asking not to be taken too seriously. Mix the three sizes any way you want, and place them in any direction – being a little unexpected will only strengthen the look.



MONICA FÖRSTER



We meet up with Monica in her design studio in Stockholm, a place bursting with creativity. Six people work here, with Monica as Creative Director. Ideas, prototypes, research material and final results from projects that Monica Förster Design Studio (MFDS) has been or will be involved in, can be found on walls, shelves and windowsills around the studio. The productivity as well as the variety in expression is striking. – We work on an international level, that's where our clients are, and the wide range is necessary, Monica explains. I find it really stimulating to work in a cross-disciplinary way, with innovation and future techniques.

Diverse projects, similar process

 No matter what the project is, our way of taking on something new is always the same, says Monica. We start with the idea and the concept, always with the question why in mind. There is a vast research phase in the initial stage of a project, that has been the case with Habo Selection too. Knowledge about the company, the brand, what others do and have done in the same area, makes a solid background to build on. Following trends, on the other hand, is not a priority. – We need to be aware of trends, of course, Monica explains. However, knowing what is trending at a certain time, we may just as well choose to do the opposite. That is probably more like us, actually.


Typically timeless

Monica describes her design as durable and long-lasting, with a strong wish to add something innovative to the brand. Her products stand the test of time, and her aim is for them to feel just as relevant in 20 years as they do today. – I don't want my design to feel dated after a few years. Instead, I like it to be a little hard to know if these hooks and knobs are new, or if they have been around for a long time.

A playful collaborative family

Monica Förster's collection for Habo Selection consists of hooks and knobs in a family of three, made from recycled brass. The series comes in two different finishes – one polished and one powder coated matt black. The collection has a distinct, sleek and rather sculptural form, and with the three sizes Monica hopes to encourage creativity. The hooks and knobs can be used on kitchen drawers or cupboard doors, or mounted on a wall, alone or in a group, providing both function and decoration.

- The idea behind them, and what I think makes them interesting, is the way they interact with each other, Monica describes. I hope people will see possibilities in combining them to get personal interior accessories, she continues. There's really no wrong way here.
